Hydrogen has been found to be a clean energy source. But it is still in progress because of some complications on how to transport it, including the weight and volume of the storage systems, the price of hydrogen is very high and not many people can afford to have hydrogen powered vehicles. It has to be extracted from compounds from which it doesn't want to be separated, taking a lot of energy. Fuel cells are expensive because they are complex and require materials such as platinum. A hydrogen fuel cell will last 312 miles to 380 miles. Hydrogen fuel cell vehicles are safer than cars with internal combustion engines.

Krishna Jayanthi

The festival Sri Krishna Jayanti is also known as Gokulashtami and Janmashtami. The actual day of celebration can be on two different days as the stars 'Rohini' and 'Ashtami' may not be on the same day.



Why is it called Janmashtami?

Janmashtami is a Hindu festival celebrating the birth (janma) of the god Krishna on the eighth (Ashtami) day of the dark fortnight of the month of Bhadrapada (August-September). The number eight has another significance in the Krishna legend in that he is the eighth child of his mother, Devaki.



Food is a key ingredient for Janmashtami: Krishna loved to have flavoured milk and curds, so meals are prepared from these ingredients. Temples prepare at least one hundred and eight different food dishes on Janmashtami. At home, people do the pooja by offering flowers and naivedyam.

Items like seedai, murukku, laddu, appam, payasam/Kheer, etc. are prepared and Mangala aarti is performed to Lord Krishna's Idol or photo.

Madras Day

"What began as a transaction of a piece of land at Fort St. George, today stands tall as one of India's biggest cities."

Madras day is celebrated in commemoration of a pact linked 382 years ago. Madras day is celebrated every year on 22nd of August. It was the day when East India Company's Andrew Cogan and Francis Day purchased the village of Madrasapatnam from Venkatadri Nayaka who was then the emperor of the Vijayanagar empire. The British then constructed the St George Fort and eventually started to develop the city of Madras.

The concept of celebrating Madras Day was conceptualised in 2004 by Vincent D'Souza. He pitched the idea to S. Muthiah during a meeting of trustees of the Chennai Heritage Foundation and from then on Madras Day is celebrated with complete glory. The Chennaites, the chief minister, and all Indians with a yellow heart, the famous CSK fan club celebrate this day with great splendour.

Some intriguing facts about Chennai which make us the proud "makkal" of Chennai are:

- The first city in India to have a vast network of Wi-Fi is none other than Chennai.
- The Madras High Court building is the second biggest judicial structure in WORLD after the building in London.
- The first manufacturing plant of BMW was set up in Chennai.
- The oldest cricket stadium in India is located in Chennai known as Chepauk M.A. Chidambaram stadium.

• The remarkable landmark of the city, St. George's Cathedral has the cemetery of Captain Christopher Biden, who had worked for the British East India Company. He is the great-greatgrandfather of US President Joe Biden.

R K Narayanan Day

The Malgudi Man

R K Narayan was a phenomenal writer , known famously for his work set on the fictional South Indian town MALGUDI. His first published work was a book review of *Development of Maritime Laws of 17th-Century England*. He also started writing for newspapers and English magazines. The English Teacher, Waiting for the Mahatma, The Guide, The Man-Eater of Malgudi, The Vendor of Sweets , A Tiger for Malgudi & Swami and his friends were some of his famous literature. The Guide bagged the Sahitya Academy award.





R K Narayan always wrote with a natural humour and his characters focused on ordinary people. That made his novels much more relatable to the readers. His exquisite style of writing, brought him many admirers as well as recognition. He was regarded as one of the leading writers of early English literature. In his career, he had received many awards, notably the Sahitya Academy award, Padma Vibushan and Padma Bhushan. He was also nominated for the Rajya Sabha. He died in 2001. In 2014, Google commemorated the 108th birth anniversary of RK Narayan with a doodle designed from his most popular novel – MALGUDI DAYS.



R K Narayan's legacy is known worldwide and is applauded even today. He is one of those novelists who will stay in the hearts of his readers always. We celebrated his glorious life in school making posters and reading his wonderful books.

The programme commenced with the welcome address given by the Vice Principal, Smt. B. Rajalakshmi, which was followed by the inaugural speech given by the Chief Guest, who gave a detailed account of the important monuments in India. She also emphasised the need to preserve the rich cultural heritage of India.



A speech on Madras Day was given by Aarush A. D. of class VIII. Aarush spoke about the significance of Madras day and the need to protect the various monuments in the city. Kriti Vikash of class IV gave a speech on the various tourist destinations of Chennai, which are still standing tall today. The programme concluded with the vote of thanks, followed by the National Anthem.



Workshop on Sri Adishankara and Ancient Wisdom by Sri Vidyatheertha Foundation



A workshop was conducted by the Vidyatheertha Foundation from 22nd to 25th August,2022 in association with the Sringeri Mutt, on the teachings of Sri Adishankara and his ancient teachings in Sringeri, Karnataka . Our Principal Sri P.G. Subramanian , along with four of our teachers, Smt. Sindhuri Smt. C.R H. Sangeeta,Smt. Rajeshwari Ramprabhu, and Smt. Preetha attended the workshop.

The workshop covered Sri Adishankara's treatises and writings, and his vision for national integration. It also covered topics of traditional importance like the Upanishads, details on temple architecture, and ways to propagate cultural and humane values to the next generation.

The workshop's material resounds with Bhavans' own culture and values. It emphasises the importance of national integrity while imbibing values in the younger generations, both of which are core goals of Bharatiya Vidya Bhavan.

Following this, Bhavan's also welcomed the Vidyatheertha Foundation and hosted them for the first ever in-person celebration of Sri Adishankara Day, by inviting them to conduct a seminar on his teachings and philosophy for the students of classes 11 and 12 on the 1st of September.

Seminar on Biotechnology



On 17 August, 2022, a seminar on biotechnology was organised by our school and presented by final Β. Tech. Bio Technology students of year Rajalakshmi Engineering College. This was a part of their college research project - CURLIM, which focused on removing cadmium ions known to be hazardous to health from industrial effluents by using the bacterium E.coli to cause bioprecipitation of the ions. The seminar's explanation of the concept of biotechnology and genetic engineering as well as a PowerPoint presentation to accompany it were used to educate Class 12 Biology students on the topic.



The significance of genetic engineering, recombinant DNA technology, microbiology, and synthetic biology was highlighted. For example, the use of genetic engineering of bacteria to make insulin for diabetics, insertion of recombinant DNA into a bacterial cell to create novel genetic combinations useful for science. medicine, agriculture, and the use of immunotherapy to combat cancer and 3D-printing of human tissue.

Good laboratory practices and ethics that must be followed, such as adopting standard procedures and systematic approaches to conducting the experiments, recording data and documenting observations and keeping tabs on financial lab expenditures through audits was discussed.



The seminar concluded with hands-on experiments done by Class 12 students under the guidance of the student representatives from Rajalakshmi Engineering College. Extraction of DNA from fruits (strawberry) using ethanol, pipetting techniques to practise precision when handling the pipette, identification of adulteration in food such as peas and black pepper, and exposure to bacteria cultured in a medium were among these experiments.

The session was an incredibly useful and motivating one!

Raksha Bandhan



Significance

Raksha Bandhan is a well-known traditionally Hindu annual rite or ceremony. Apart from Hindu dominant regions, it is observed in other regions of the world that have been greatly influenced by Hindu culture. On this day, sisters of all ages tie their brothers' wrists with a charm or amulet known as the Rakhi. They give them a gift in exchange for protecting them.



This festival not only strengthens the bond between siblings, but also has the power to reunite lost relationships. You never know when you will lose your loved ones....

Some interesting facts...

 The sacred thread of the Rakhi is tied by sisters on the wrists of their brothers. In some regions of the country like Uttar Pradesh, Rakhi is tied by a sister to her sister-in-law as well. These Rakhis are called Lumba Rakhis.

- The festival of Rakhi is celebrated in the USA, Sri Lanka, Nepal, Mauritius, and the UAE due to its beautiful nature of representing a universal bond between sisters and brothers.
- Nobel prize winner Rabindranath Tagore used the festival Raksha Bandhan to maintain peace and harmony between Hindu and the Muslim communities during the 1905, Partition of Bengal.
- It is believed that Lord Vishnu gave a boon to the demon king Bali, that he would stay in his palace, but Goddess Lakshmi did not want to do so. She tied a rakhi to Bali and asked him to let Lord Vishnu go in return.

Krithika and Varsha of 11B conducted a working 5E car model run on the reaction of baking soda in vinegar.

This car was made using a bottle and 4 bottle caps as wheels with a hole in the cap of the

bottle. They explained more about the reactions that had occurred and the Physics behind it.

The head of the club, Varshha of 12B, then explained the workings of the club in detail and discussed the latest events that had occurred in the field of science. The topics

for the next few sessions were also debated on and a few students had also introduced themselves with their scientific names.

SESSION 2

The second session was held on 17th August, under the supervision of Smt. Balambigai and Smt. Karthika Sudarsen from 3PM to 4PM.
